Year in Review 2021-2022





This Year:

- Project Look traveled to school sites in the Fall of 2021 to provide "field trips" to local classrooms. In the Spring of 2022, classrooms returned to the Art Center for in-person and on-site field trips. It was a cause for celebration!
- 2,235 students, teachers, and chaperones participated in 85 tours this school year. Classrooms spent time viewing art from the exhibitions in their classrooms or the Art Center's galleries with a trained docent and participated in a hands-on artmaking activity that emphasized the theme of the exhibition.
- 42 classrooms from the Ravenswood City School District in East Palo Alto, totaling 1,050 students, participated in a Project Look tour at no cost thanks to the Art Center Foundation's support of scholarships.
- Six stellar docents supported the return to on-site tours.
- Project Look supports the development of 21st-century skills. Teachers report their Art Center experience allowed their students to practice creativity (100%), communication (86.5%), and critical thinking (91.5%).
